During my fellowship year, I took the opportunity to attend various international conferences, including ESGE Days, UEG Week, International AEM, etc. I also benefitted tremendously from dedicated in-house hands-on training courses for regional fellows and trainees.

In the midst of training, I had great times with the entire endoscopy team. I truly appreciate their hospitality, and already miss them dearly.

## TIPS & TRICKS AS AN ENDOSCOPY TRAINER

In many respects, medicine is an apprenticeship and we rely on good tutelage from experienced doctors to educate and inspire us. Endoscopy training is no exception to this but teaching a practical skill is not without its challenges. Teaching may come naturally to some of us but even so, it is always useful to develop a structure to facilitate a good teaching episode. A good endoscopy trainer is patient, insightful and able to be both consciously competent in teaching and in performing endoscopy.

As I reflect on what makes good endoscopy training, I would like to share some key points that I hope will help. These have been garnered from my own experience in teaching trainees from different streams within the UK's National Health Service (medical, surgical, nurse endoscopists) and derived from material we teach on nationally accredited "train-the-trainer" endoscopy courses.

## KEY POINT 1: ALIGN AGENDAS AND EXPECTATIONS ('SET THE SCENE')

Establish what the trainee wants to learn during a list/procedure – is this achievable or feasible? Is there a mismatch between what you feel the trainee should be learning and what he/she wishes to do? It is useful to understand your trainee's skill

level and agree on a suitable objective at the start of the training list. A trainee who is not yet competent in scope handling and tip control cannot expect to start therapeutic procedures and these expectations should be managed appropriately. Conversely, some trainees may already have acquired excellent basic techniques and should be encouraged to take the next step with learning advanced endoscopy.

Each trainee may have an individual approach to training and it is important to recognise different styles of learning – ranging from the dependent to the self-directed learner. Reflect and recognise your own training style – are you one with an 'authority style', or are you a delegator, facilitator or motivator? There may be situations where there is a mismatch between the trainee's learning style and the trainer's teaching style which mean that training together would not be in either's best interests (e.g, an authority style trainer with a self-directed learner).

## KEY POINT 2: OPTIMISE YOUR TEACHING ENVIRONMENT

Consider the physical set up of the room and ergonomics. I find it useful to be able to observe the trainee's hand position on the scope, as well

as the endoscopy screen, monitor and patient. Avoid distractions or interruptions when training that can lead to errors. This includes noise levels as endoscopy rooms can get busy with multiple staff around.

## KEY POINT 3: USE A COMMON LANGUAGE WHEN TEACHING ENDOSCOPY ('DIALOGUE')

Use language that is clear and concise. For example, use a clock face to localise positions on the endoscopy screen (e.g, rotate the polyp round to 6 o'clock). Establish the common terms of instruction in training - e.g, using the endoscopy image as a point of reference rather than hand movements – so terms such as 'tip up' or 'tip down' are more easily understood rather than 'big wheel up/big wheel down'. Trainees can be prone to cognitive overload, and so sometimes, asking them to talk through what they are doing can hamper their progress. I find it more useful to ask the trainees to stop and then explain their challenges – this allows them to process the information you have given them so they are better able to navigate through the part of the procedure that they may have found difficult.

## KEY POINT 4: HOW TO DECIDE WHEN IT IS APPROPRIATE TO TAKE OVER THE SCOPE

A good teaching episode should be interactive, encourage problem solving rather than leaving the trainee to struggle on with minimal feedback during the procedure culminating in the trainer taking the scope over without enough directed instruction to enable the trainee to progress.

Patient factors are the most important consideration here – if the patient is in excessive pain, or there are concerns about physiological parameters/vital signs and safety, it is imperative to take over the scope. It is also important to consider the length of time of the procedure, the need for the patient to have a good experience and not be put off coming for future procedures, if required. If the trainee is unable

to understand your instructions, is not listening or failing to progress despite clear instructions, then taking over the scope is necessary. I always emphasise to my trainees not to feel discouraged if I do take over the scope as that is a golden opportunity for focused teaching and allows them space to observe and reflect without the pressure of a difficult endoscopy. There is a lot that can be learnt by guided observation and targeted questions to keep the trainee engaged.

#### **KEY POINT 5: FEEDBACK ('CLOSURE')**

I think it is insightful to ask the trainees to provide feedback on the procedure/their performance first, before delving into the feedback you can give them. This is also a good gauge to understand if there is a mismatch between the trainees real and perceived endoscopy skills – some trainees under-estimate their abilities and are overly self critical whilst others are over-confident and may not recognise their weaknesses. Encourage reflection and provide feedback that will enhance their next procedure – we use a formative assessment tool known as DOPS (direct observation of procedural skills) that enables structured feedback.

Finally, a good trainee-trainer relationship evolves over time and trainees should also be encouraged to provide feedback on their endoscopy trainers too. Quality in endoscopy should never be compromised and a good endoscopy trainer is also one who aims to teach both technical and non-technical skills in endoscopy – emphasising situational awareness, leadership and overall medical judgment. Whilst endoscopy training can be tricky at times, structuring your approach using the set-dialogue-closure method above and having a strong open and honest reflective style is what I often find works best in facilitating a rewarding teaching experience for both trainee and trainer.



Who doesn't love a freebie! In the digital era, the internet has inundated us with a wealth of leaving us spoiled

information, leaving us spoiled for choice. It is the classic first world problem – an abundance of options making it tricky to decide. The result? We often find ourselves

spending more time searching and scrolling than actually gaining knowledge. This article aims to provide some guidance to what is currently available on the web suited to your needs.

#### 1. GIE and VideoGIE

Established in 1954, GIE (Gastrointestinal Endoscopy) is the official journal of the American Society for Gastrointestinal Endoscopy (ASGE). Its Open Access companion journal, VideoGIE, began in 2016, meeting the rising demand for video publications. As a Q1 journal, GIE focuses on novel techniques tailored to gung-ho advanced endoscopists. GIE also provides valuable free basic educational videos (search 'top tips with video'), e.g, "Top tips for maximum detection during colonoscope withdrawal by Douglas Rex", "Top tips for cold snare polypectomy by Michael Bourke" and "Top 10 things to remember when cannulating the bile duct in patients with native papillary anatomy during ERCP by Douglas Adler". These videos, however, lack running commentary and instead function as complementary supplements to their respective articles.

#### 2. Endoscopy

Another Q1 journal, Endoscopy is the European counterpart to GIE. It has an E-videos section with three main categories: Clinical Case Library, Complication Library and Therapy and Technical Tricks Gallery. Subcategories include upper GI, small bowel endoscopy, colonoscopy, ERCP, EUS and more. While it has fewer basic technique videos, it is comparatively easier to navigate with a drop-down list of videos in each subcategory.

#### 3. Endoscopy On Air

"Made by physicians, for physicians", Endoscopy On Air is the world's largest virtual endoscopy events platform. Free to register and unlimited views of a huge collection of videos. The cost? Absolutely nothing! I'm most impressed with the "Global Event" series, which includes live recordings ranging from basic colonoscopy and polypectomy videos to

## SCOPE THE FREEBIES A ROUND-UP OF ACCESSIBLE ENDOSCOPY TRAINING VIDEOS

They feature a stellar faculty, Pradeep Bhandari, Nageshwar Reddy, Michael Bourke, Douglas Rex, Amrita Sethi, to name a few. It also regularly broadcasts live symposia, mainly from Europe and the UK; the only drawback is the time zone difference.

#### 4. GastroLearning

Similar to Endoscopy On Air, the group at UCL (University College London) provides a range of bite-sized training videos, from basic lectures on diathermy settings, demonstration videos on endoscopic techniques, to showing video snippets from their annual London Live Endoscopy symposium. While their website offers free registration and allows you to subscribe to event updates, it's best to access their videos through YouTube which features a more extensive collection than their website.

#### 5. GIEQs

Launched by the University Hospital of Ghent, GIEQs (pronounced as 'geeks') is part of the Gastrointestinal Endoscopy Quality and Safety Foundation. Dedicated to improving endoscopy quality for everyday endoscopists, this platform includes videos ranging from basic techniques, lesion recognition and assessment, to advanced haemostatic and polypectomy skills. Whilst most of the structured content requires a subscription fee of  $\in$ 7 or  $\in$ 15 per month (a little pricier than Netflix; and yes, I know this is not counted as a freebie) or pay-per-view ( $\in$ 10 to  $\in$ 50), the search function, particularly for 'masterclass' and 'colonoscopy', would point towards a few good quality endoscopy training videos.

There are, of course, many more platforms out there, for example, YouTube has a few playlists worth mentioning: FREEndoscopy (The Foundation for Research and Education in Endoscopy) hosted by Amol Bapaye for a comprehensive webinar lecture series ("East meets West" series is most recommended); Olympus Medical Systems EMEA-Gastroenterology, Cook Medical Endoscopy Channel, Micro-Tech Endoscopy for familiarisation of equipment/accessories and some basic technique demonstrations.

These are my top five recommendations. Happy scoping!

Following these insightful presentations, two case



#### The 2024 Hospital Kuala Lumpur GI-HEP Update

Hospital Kuala Lumpur's (HKL) Gastroenterology and Hepatology Unit hosted the "HKL GI-HEP Update 2024" at the Institute of Medical Research in Kuala Lumpur on 26<sup>th</sup> February 2024. The event aimed to facilitate knowledge exchange and professional development among medical officers and healthcare professionals serving in general medicine and primary care in the Klang Valley.

Approximately 60 doctors attended, including primary care practitioners, medical officers serving in hospitals and Klinik Kesihatan, as well as physicians from various specialties. Providing updates in various topics were consultant gastroenterologists, hepatologists and a colorectal surgeon. "Although it was challenging to design an update that can cater to different levels of participants, I am grateful for the unwavering support from our head of unit Dr Gew Lai Teck, colleagues, endoscopy team, especially MN Nurul Fazly, and the medical officers who worked tirelessly to put forward a meaningful update", said Dr Praveenna Nagaratnam, consultant gastroenterologist in HKL who was the driving force behind the update.

"As a tertiary referral centre with advanced endoscopic capabilities, HKL offers a variety of gastrointestinal services for the patients within the Klang Valley", remarked Dr Mohd Syafiq Ismail Azman, Deputy Director of HKL in his speech. "As such, it is imperative that our fellow practitioners remain relevant to the latest updates in order to provide the best possible care to our patients", he further added.

The day began with Dr Norasiah binti Abu Bakar, consultant gastroenterologist from Hospital Raja Permaisuri Zainab II, Kota Bharu, Kelantan, discussing the management of patients with Proton Pump Inhibitor (PPI) refractory reflux, followed by insights from HKL's Dr Hari Suthan into early detection of gastrointestinal cancer.

Dr Mohamed Amin bin Kader, consultant gastroenterologist from Hospital Sultanah Nora Ismail, Batu Pahat, Johor, outlined strategies for addressing resistant H. pylori infections. Dr Nik Razima bt Wan Ibrahim, consultant gastroenterologist from Hospital Ampang, Selangor, then explored treatment options and pipeline therapies for inflammatory bowel disease.

Providing expert advice on managing irritable bowel syndrome with constipation (IBS-C) was consultant colorectal surgeon, Dr Nur Afdzillah Abdul Rahman, from Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia, Kuala Lumpur. Post-lunch, Dr Philip Pang highlighted the growing prevalence of Metabolic Associated Fatty Liver Disease (MAFLD). Dr Gew Lai Teck, head of HKL's Gastroenterology and Hepatology Unit led a discussion on advancements in advanced endoscopy, providing valuable insights into future interventions.

Ending the session was senior consultant hepatologist, Dr Tan Soek Siam, from Hospital Selayang, Selangor, who shared practical approaches to managing cirrhotic patients, referencing the Baveno VII guidelines.




